Musings from the Manse

"Life goes on."

A few months back I was in Glasgow visiting my daughters for a few days. The highlight of my trip was to be a visit to an Italian restaurant in the west end of Glasgow. Our table had been booked and I had already looked at the menu online and made my selections. That's how much I was looking forward to it.

So, we get to the restaurant.

It was a busy Friday night in Glasgow. The restaurant was crowded with diners. There was a joyful hubbub of merriment. Not a seat to be had. Lots of families enjoying dinner and folks out celebrating all sorts of festivities. At the table next to us there was what looked like an office night out. They

looked like professionals, fairly sedate and well behaved as you would expect from people who appeared to be in their 40s. They were just finishing their meal. All of a sudden one of their number, slumped forward and there was a scream from someone at the table who then gestured desperately to the waiting staff. A first aider was quickly despatched as the man's friends gently lowered him to the floor. It seemed for a few moments that there was no sign of life. The whole restaurant held its breath.

However, within a few minutes the man was back in his seat surrounded by concerned colleagues and looking a ghastly shade of grey. An ambulance was sent for and the man was able to walk out to the street unaided.

Several minutes later one of those who had been with him at the table came back to report that the man had been checked out and he was ok.

When the drama was over, we went back to our meal although our appetites were now somewhat diminished.

I said to my daughters, "Well, that is their night out well and truly ruined. They probably just want to get home now. They will be so worried about their poor co- worker ."

So, we were rather surprised when several bottles of wine and various cocktails arrived at the table and the party continued.

My daughter offered her take on the events, "Life goes on". Indeed, maybe there was cause for celebration - they thought their friend was dead and to find he was alive and well must have brought a sense of relief.

In these weeks after Easter we hear the stories of those who witnessed or heard about Jesus death on a cross, and those who met the post resurrection Jesus.

The women at the empty tomb, the disciples in the upper room, the folk on the road to Emmaus.

We can imagine their shock and deep disappointment at Jesus' death and their sense of joy and excitement to find that he had beaten death and was alive.

I am sure they celebrated.

Life went on.

We know from the gospels that they sat around a table with Jesus again. Cleopas and his fellow traveller recognised Jesus as he broke bread at the table in Emmaus, the disciples served Jesus a meal of broiled fish in the upper room in Jerusalem, and Jesus in turn served them breakfast on the seashore.

And so, I don't think too badly of the office party table. They had come close to witnessing death that night and perhaps they had a new sense of how precious and fragile life really is. Perhaps they were toasting their friend who was not dead but alive.

Something we remember every time we come to the Lord's table to share bread and wine together. That because of Jesus death on the cross, life goes on for us even after death.

Thanks be to the God of life, who is faithful even until death, and beyond.

Moment for Mediation

Waste Not Want Not!

At this time of year especially, I find great pleasure watching the birds feeding in the garden. There's something very peaceful and therapeutic about leaning on the window sill and watching the birds bustle about, busy with the intention of finding food. We have bird feeders in the trees in the front and back garden. The ones in the front are more exposed and not quite so popular and are mainly used by larger birds. The feeders at the back however can be emptied in the blink of an eye.

I find it fascinating watching the various feeding techniques used by the birds. The coal tits and blue tits are definitely masters of the "grab and go" method. They swoop onto the feeder, grab a seed, nut or whatever and flit off again to the safety of a higher branch where they take time to savour their pickings. Starlings arrive en masse and perform amazing acrobatics to balance on the feeders, pecking continuously. Their aim seems to be to grab all they can while they can. This can continue for quite some time then it's as if there's a hidden signal and they scatter as quickly as they came. In the meantime, the sparrows join the melee and cling resolutely to the feeders, methodically picking what they want. The pigeons, often unsuccessfully, also try to balance on the feeders. However, all is not lost for the sparrows and starlings spill as much as they eat. The pigeons then strut their stuff at ground level. Soon, they will be joined by the blackbirds who scuttle out from their hidey hole in the bushes and peck contentedly at the "leftovers". The thrush arrives and easily shares the space with the blackbirds. Our robin emerges and perches on the bird bath commandeering a watchful position before he too feasts at ground level. Not to be outdone, the pigeons and sparrows rejoin this happy gang. Nothing is wasted – waste not, want not!

It makes me think of the household waste which is produced nowadays. Where does all this waste come from? There are only two of us in our house and yet we easily fill our bins, grey bin, purple bin, brown bin, green bin. I find it interesting travelling around that you don't need a sign telling you, you are in a different district, Dundee, Fife, Perth and Kinross or wherever, just look at the changing colour and style of the bins! In addition to the bins there is also a trip to the supermarket with a bag of "soft plastics" for recycling. Soft or hard, it is plastic that is the problem.

I was thinking back to when I was wee and we had one bin-an old galvanised thing which was emptied weekly. I just can't remember what went in it. Can anyone reading remember what went in the dustbin? We had a coal fire so anything that could be burnt was burnt. "Go and throw that on the fire," was a repeated request. Most things were paper and the fire fairly ate up the rubbish. My Dad had a compost heap at the foot of the garden- the midden – and any food waste was deposited there. There was seldom any food itself wasted. It was for the tattie peelings, veggie scrapings, egg shells and such like. Times were different, we definitely didn't produce anything like the amount of household waste we do nowadays and so it remains a mystery- what went in our dustbin?

Our planet is such a wonderful creation. Nature and beauty are all around us wherever we care to look. Whether it is the awesome wonder of lochs and mountains and huge panoramas or the simple beauty closer to home, our garden, the seashore, the park it is there in all the seasons. It's ever changing yet ever constant. I think the least we can do is to do what we can to be better custodians of God's creation.

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


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
