

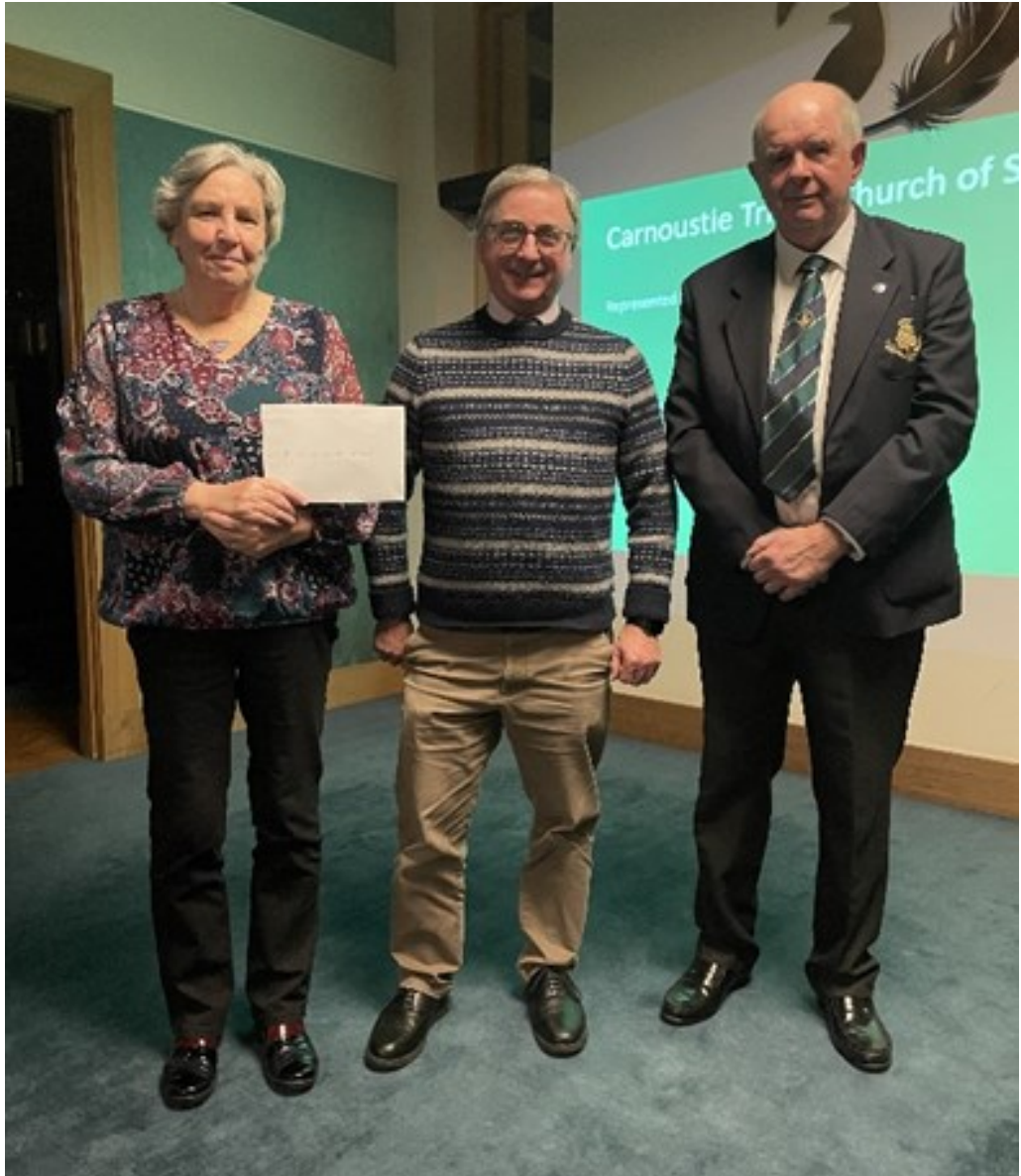

Musings from the Manse



“Love is come again, like wheat that springeth green.

It has already ben a very long hard winter. This is always a rather dreary time of year for most of us.. The joy of Christmas has log faded and the hope and new life promised at Easter is still a while away. Easter is late this year! As I write this there is a deep, sparkling frost covering the garden but up above are blue skies and sunshine.

And in a corner of the garden little snowdrops are breaking through the hard brown earth.

A reminder that the brighter days of spring are just around the corner.

The promise of longer and warmer days is surely something to lift our spirits. The garden has been so dead and bare through these winter months but in time there will be a host of golden daffodils and then a blanket of purple, blue, and violet bluebells.

Soon, as a congregation, our thoughts will turn to Lent, a time of preparation as we journey towards the Cross. And then comes the joy of Easter morning and resurrection glory.

One of my favourite Easter hymns very much describes this season of Lent and Easter, of quiet growth in the dark and then bursting forth at Easter in resurrection joy. John MacLeod Campbell Crum describes this process vividly in his hymn, “Now the green blade riseth”.

Crum, an ordained Anglican priest, was inspired to write the hymn by the words of John 12: 23 – 24:

“Jesus replied, “The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds”

Crum is speaking in the first part of the hymn about Jesus’ death and resurrection but in the fourth verse, he turns to speak of human struggle,

When our hearts are wintry, grieving, or in pain,

thy touch can call us back to life again,

fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been:

Love is come again,

like wheat that springeth green.

It has been a long winter already, and we are not out of it yet. March can be a cold month with sharp winds.

However, we have this promise of spring, and the promise of Jesus, the one raised back to life on the third day, the one “whose touch can call us back to life again.”

At the start of February, Rhona and I took the opportunity of a day off to visit Edinburgh and catch up with family. We were just outside the National Museum of Scotland (what we used to call the Chambers Street Museum) when we saw a stream of cyclists pouring past us and heading past Greyfriars’ Bobby, all wearing a garish blue and yellow tartan. It was a sponsored cycle in aid of the Doddy Weir Foundation raising funds for Motor Neurone Disease.

They looked exhausted but triumphant after their 700 miles by bike! What a great cause, and what a tremendous result, raising over half a million pounds.

Fund raising often seems like a challenging effort – whether it be for the major renovation project planned for Carnoustie Church, or simply trying to cover the substantial ‘ordinary’ costs of our Ministries and all that makes up Carnoustie Trinity. We are truly grateful for the support for many of our fundraising ventures, coffee mornings, events and sales. However, the bulk of our giving comes from the regular giving of our members, through the offering plate or through bank standing orders. Much of this is quite sacrificial, and for all of your giving, we thank you.

Christian giving is not simply a response to the Church’s need. At its heart, our giving is about our response to what God has given us. Life – in all the joys and sorrows we share. And new life in Jesus Christ. That was bought at the terrible price of the cross, which we reflect on again this coming Easter. We give not as a reluctant sop to our conscience, but because He first gave to us; the joyful response of grateful hearts to the Love of God revealed in His Son.

“For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you through His poverty might become rich.” 2 Corinthians 8:

Mrs Sandra Penman



Sandra was lifelong member of the Church of Scotland in Carnoustie. She was baptised and then joined St Stephens. Her membership continued after the union when the two churches became Carnoustie Church. Sandra helped in any way she could in church life including being a Sunday School teacher but her claim to fame and in the role most of us remember her doing, was when she took on the role of Flower Convenor in 1984.

At that time there was a team of people, mainly ladies, who took turns arranging and delivering the flowers every week. This work continued with Sandra helping to advise the minister of various anniversaries, memorable birthdays, family illness as well as family bereavements, until Covid hit in 2020. She was a fount of knowledge of families in the town and could be relied upon to know the happenings of church members and their relatives, even during lockdown times.

When the church opened again fresh flowers still could not be delivered but cards could and until we had fresh flowers in the church again, Sandra sent cards. By September 2021, flowers were back and although the flower team had depleted because of illness or frailty, the Kirk Session agreed that this important ministry should continue on a monthly basis. This was done as often as possible through the different lockdown rules and Sandra continued to oversee the arranging and delivering of the flowers until her final illness at the end of 2024.

Sandra took on this missional role conscientiously with integrity and dignity. As the minister said at her funeral, Sandra could have become the town's worst gossip but chose to use her gift in a different direction and for the benefit of others. She was one of a kind and is, and will continue to be, sorely missed by all who knew her.

Carnoustie Church Building Project

Preparation for Carnoustie Church Project is ongoing and in the summer an application was submitted to Carnoustie Golf Links Community Benefit Fund for a grant towards the cost of the disabled ramp in the church which will give access to St. Stephen's Chapel, chancel area, vestry and rear door of the church. We are delighted to say that we received a grant of £2,500 towards the cost of this. Many thanks to the Carnoustie Golf Links Community Benefit Fund for their generosity.

As many of you will now know, the sale of the Philip Hall has been completed (at long last), meaning that the minimum funding required to begin the work has now been realised.

Meetings have been taking place with the local project team, as well as with the architects, to tidy up the plans and make sure we have not forgotten anything. There is still a bit of work to do to sort out the electrics for the lighting, sockets and for the kitchen area as well as plumbing and heating but this is all underway now. The architect will prepare plans to put the work out for tender and as long as the General Trustees agree with all the plans, we can get the work started.

Of course, with the unforeseen delay in selling the hall, prices will have increased a bit and all the necessary workmen will be busy so it might be into the summer months before we see a start being made on site. However, this will give time to make sure all the items which require to be stored out with the church are done so safely and everything that can be retained in the church is safely stored. It also means that fundraising can continue, so please help if you can and support all the organised events that may be planned over the coming months. Many thanks to everyone who has patiently organised, attended and supported all the fundraising so far. There is light at the end of this very long tunnel!!

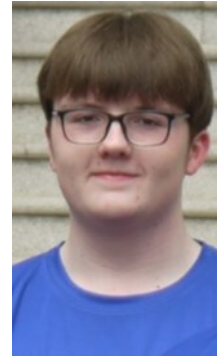

The food was very interesting and fancy (I tried lobster for the first time which I thought was very nice) and Macao was a lot more modern than I had thought whilst still incorporating traditional Chinese culture. Watching and participating in world class traditional table tennis was such an eye opening experience which allowed me to meet so many inspiring people from all over the world. MAF

This story tells how MAF is used to help in different ways in God's name.

Before nine-year-old Emmanuel encountered the organisation, **Waves for Change** in Liberia, his mental health was poor, and he struggled with his speech.

But thanks to the charity's surf therapy and mentorship programmes, his confidence has grown, and he even came second in the national surfing competition last year.

'Before Waves for Change, life felt like a storm. I didn't have direction or goals, but surfing taught me balance, not just on the board but in life,' explains Emmanuel.

Now aged thirteen, Emmanuel is mentoring younger participants, developing his leadership skills. 'Helping others through the programme has taught me to believe in myself. If I could help someone else stand up on a wave, I realised I could stand tall in life, too.'

MAF has been supporting Waves for Change by transporting surfing coaches, equipment and resources to isolated coastal areas, expanding their reach and impact in Liberia.

Before MAF started flying the NGO, its staff had to travel for more than three days on dangerous and rough roads. Now, it only takes a 90-minute flight to reach their destination.

Emmanuel, who has participated in multiple surfing competitions, appreciates the MAF flights that give him and the team the opportunity to travel.

'Flying with MAF was unforgettable,' he recalls, reflecting on the first time he flew with us. 'It was my first time in a plane, and it felt like I was riding the waves of the sky. It reminded me how far I've come.'
